of the original US Patent and Trademark Office (re-

sponsible for registering and issuing thousands of fashion trademarks and patents since 1836) and the Senate Judiciary Committee (lauded for approving the Innovative Design Protection and Piracy Prevention Act t introduced by NY Senator Schumer.)

Following the theme, "Intelligent Design: Protecting IP in the Fashion Industry," Fashion Law Week provided its attendees with a substantive overview of the need to protect fashion IP and showcased several emerging local designers. Events included a prom dress drive (in conjunction with Once Upon a Prom); a Round Table Discussion hosted by SBC Law Group and a Keynote address featuring Professor

Guillermo Jimenez, Professor of International Trade and Marketing at the Fashion Institute of Technology; and a fashion presentation featuring designers from HUSL and the WDC fashion communities.

We especially enjoyed the Fashion Law Roundtable discussion held on March 1, 2011 moderated by local

fashion attorney Mariessa Terrell featuring local fashion law leaders namely, Kwame Brown, Chairman, DC City Council (co-sponsor of Bill 17-0248 to create a DC Fashion Commission), Stephany Greene, Founder Fashion Merchandising Program CCDC, Michael Grow, Partner, Arent Fox LLP, Michelle Mitchell, Associate Director National Export Initiative International Trade Association, Kristina Montanaro, Candidate for Master of Laws in IP, May 2011, Darrel Gilbert Mottley, President, DC Bar Association & Patent Attorney, Banner & Witcoff, Ltd. and Harry Thomas, Jr., Council Member Ward 5 & Chair of DC Council Committee on Economic Development (co-sponsor of Bill 17-0248 to create a DC Fashion Commission).


recent proposals to combat outright design piracy.
